**English translation:**

S: As for the Moroccan productions, are there Moroccan TV series?

Y: There are many Moroccan series, but people are not interested in the Moroccan series because they are still not as developed as Middle Eastern series. Because of this, the Moroccan youths watch series from satellite-dish channels. The audiovisual media needs to be developed more – it is still not developed much. Sadly, there aren't many programs that can be useful to the youth. People need to have less of these series and instead more useful programs. The news-bulletins are good, but sadly they are still not developed when it comes to other programs.
