Video description:

On holidays like Timket, the equivalent of Epiphany, the major churches have processions centered on their *tabot*. The procession may include a short sermon, group singing, singing by the choirs, a liturgical dance performed by the priest, and, of course, the *tabot* wrapped in cloth and carried on the head of a priest. This procession is from St. Michael's church and is traveling on Bole Road, one of the busiest and better known roads in Addis Ababa.

These choirs are made up of young members of the Ethiopian Orthodox Church. They are accompanied by large drums. During the procession, they occasionally stop to sing.

² Each major church in Ethiopian Orthodoxy has *tabot* which can refer to a replica of the Ark of the Covenant or of the stone tablets on which the Ten Commandments were written. During the procession, the *tabot* is always wrapped in cloth.
