**Studying Business Communication**

**Indonesian transcript:**

Maesya: Apakah Tenike pergi ke universitas?

Tenike: eh . . . ya. Saya kuliah di Universitas Atmajaya di Jakarta

M: Itu universitas swasta?

T: ya itu universitas swasta yang punya yayasan em ... dari Katholik ya

M: Katolik, karena Tenika kan orang Kristen ya

T: iya

M: Eh . . . belajar apa di universitas?

T: Untuk materi pembelajarannya itu macam-macam ya . . . dapat Matematika, Bahasa Inggris, seperti biasa hanya saya lebih memilih eh . . . jurusan komunikasi bisnis.

M: komunikasi bisnis

T: iya.

M: Eh . . . apakah banyak orang muda di Indonesia belajar di uni . . . universitas?

T: Eh . . . untuk saat ini, banyak, sudah mulai banyak karena juga eh . . . memang untuk biaya universitas memang mahal, hanya sekarang di Indonesia banyak timbul kaya lembaga-lembaga pendidikan yang setingkat dengan universitas, jadi eh . . . untuk para orang yang kurang mampu mereka bisa bersekolah di situ dengan harga yang tidak terlalu mahal

M: Eh . . . dan apakah Tenika bisa bi ... bicara bahasa Inggris?

T: Eh ... sedikit bisa.

M: Eh ... di sekolah di Indonesia itu harus belajar bahasa Inggris atau bukan?

T: Eh ... untuk materi bahasa Inggris itu memang diwajibkan, kita harus belajar, hanya pada saat untuk bahasa sehari-harinya dalam belajar itu menggunakan bahasa Indonesia.

M: Bahasa Indonesia?

T: yah

M: Buku-bukunya juga?

T: Kalau buku-buku sebaik ... kalau di universitas saya, eh ... biasanya pakai bahasa Inggris, he .. eh, hanya kita, eh ... ya, kadang-kadang, ya gabung ya, di-mix, ya antara Indonesia dan Inggris.

M: Eh ... di Indonesia yang mana jurusan paling populer sama orang muda di universitas?

T: Kalau untuk saat ini, anak-anak muda di Indonesia itu menurut saya lebih cari yang kaya ke komunikasi

M: Bisnis?

T: Eh ... komunikasi bisnis, ke PR, Public Relations, eh ... terus ke broadcast, karena pada saat ini untuk eh . . . kuliah-kuliah broadcast itu sedang, ya kalau dibilang naik daun, ya ... sedang banyak yang em ... peminatnya.

M: Dan juga ada banyak investasi luar ya .. ?

T: iya betul

M: di industri ini

T: iya betul

**English translation:**

Maesya: Did you, Tenike, study in a university?

Tenike : Uh ... yes, I went to Atmajaya University in Jakarta.

M: Is that a private university?

T: Yes, it's a private university that belongs to a Catholic Foundation.

M: Catholic, because Tenike, you are a Christian, aren't you?

T: Yes.

M: Uh ... what did you study at the university?

T: I studied a variety of courses.... I got mathematics, English as usual, but I preferred specializing in business communication.

M: Business communication.

T: Yes.

M: Uh ... are there a lot of young Indonesians studying in uni ... universities?

T: Uh ... now there are a lot of people. Uh ... actually, the tuition fee for universities is costly, but now in Indonesia, educational institutions that are equal to universities are mushrooming, so those who cannot afford to go to expensive universities, they can choose to go to cheaper educational institutions instead.

M: Uh ... Tenika, can you spe ....speak English?

T: Uh ... I can but only a little.

M: Uh ... Do we have to study English in Indonesian schools?

T: Eh ... English is compulsory, we have to study it. But, the Indonesian language is still used as the main language of instruction.

M: Indonesian.

T: Yeah.

M: The books, too?

T: About the books, in my university, uh ... yeah, we use English books. Uh ....yeah sometimes English and Indonesian are mixed.

M: Uh ... in Indonesia, which major is popular among young people?

T: For now, the Indonesian youth, I think, prefers sort of communication studies.

M: Business?

T: Uh ... business communication, public relations, uh ... then broadcasting, because at the moment courses on broadcasting have gained popularity.

M: And, there are also some foreign investments, right?

T: That's right.

M: In this industry . . .

T: Yes, that's right.
