

English Translation:

Woman behind camera: A comparison between for example the previous period, let's say the 50's or the 60's and between now, the new generation.

Man: The new era is an era that's more open ...aaa... it started to solve the social problems more because the social problems might be found in any family and people started to realize that the man must choose the woman, he must see her, he must date her. Man: ...Aaaa... places of work, I mean. The woman started to work. She started to work at directories and foundations and companies. If you walk an Iraqi street, you see many women there.
