English translation:

In our country the focus is generally on the business fields, whether it's economics, although economics isn't business, it's more of a social science.

Interviewer: What do you think about the medicine and engineering fields?

Teenager: Engineering is popular to quiet an extent but it does not get the same rewards in our country as compared to some other countries, where engineers get a lot of recognition. In our country engineers aren't valued as much. Medicine on the other hand has a lot of value. We in fact have a lot of good medical institutes in our country. Aga Khan is a very good university. People from abroad in fact come to study at Aga Khan University especially from the other Islamic countries and from the Middle East. A lot of Pakistani Americans also go to Aga Khan University. So medicine has a lot of prestige and value in our country. But engineering doesn't have the same value. This is the reason if some one wants to study engineering they usually go abroad. For example I have a friend who wants to be an engineer and he's gone to study at Oxford University. If he had studied it here from G.I.K. (Ghulam Ishaq Khan Institute) he wouldn't be valued as much. Like I said before, going to a foreign college will completely change your career.

Before August I had never left the country. I still haven't traveled a lot yet but hopefully by the end of these four years I will have traveled a lot.

Interviewer: You went abroad right now did you feel a difference in the values and culture of your country and that of others?

Teenager: Not really. I didn't experience a culture shock as they call it. This is because my high school in Karachi was very Americanized if I may say so. It was the most Western school in Karachi, so going abroad and seeing new things wasn't really a shock for me. Yea, I missed home, being so far away and all that but I can't say that I was shocked by anything or felt that life there was drastically different from the life I live here.
