Ukrainian transcript:

Я зараз у вишиванці — це ε українським національним одягом для жінок. Це така рубашка, яка ма ε на собі узори, як ви бачите. Це все зроблено руками людини, тобто не машиною, а просто людина сиділа і вишивала, тобто хрестиком. Дуже красиво.

Зазвичай зараз вишиванку одягають або на весілля або я, наприклад, надягаю її, коли відвідую різні фестивалі, етничні фестивалі. Я ε поклонницею такого засобу проводження часу, тобто коли ти приїжджаєш і там збирається велика кількість людей, які люблять свою країну, які люблять її музику, люблять її традиції і їм просто цікаво спілкуватися один з одним, і також просто приємно виглядати, як справжня українка в цьому вбранні.

English translation:

Right now I am wearing *vyshyvanka* – this is traditional Ukrainian clothing for women. This is a shirt that contains embroidery, as you can see. This is all done by human hands, not by machines; a person sat and cross-stitched it. Very beautiful.

Nowadays people usually wear *vyshyvanka* to weddings, or I, for example, wear it when I go to ethnic festivals. I love to spend my time at these [festivals]. [At these festivals] there are a large number of people who love their country, who love its [national] music, love its traditions, and simply are interested in talking to other people. Also, it's just nice to look like a real Ukrainian in this attire.
