## Hassaniya Arabic transcript:

## **English translation:**

**K:** What is the language spoken in Western Sahara?

**S:** The first language is of course Arabic Fus'ha [Standard Arabic]. But in fact, there is no one who speaks Fus'ha, we just study it in school and everyone speaks Hassaniya<sup>1</sup>. Hassaniya is just one of the Arabic dialects but it is very different from the rest of the dialects. For instance, my grandmother speaks only Hassaniya and she doesn't understand Fus'ha at all. Spanish is considered the second language and there are many people who speak Spanish – and especially the elderly because Western Sahara was a Spanish colony in the past and that is why a lot of people speak Spanish.
